Fields of wheat, barley and rye coming to the Hudson Valley? A CCE Hudson Valley Grains Workshop in February drew 100 participants. A four year field trial looking at select experimental grain

varieties will begin in Spring. Experimental plots will be visible from multiple fields along Route 209 between Kingston and Stone Ridge.

# Ashokan Watershed Stream Management Program (AWSMP)

**Hailed!** by attendees as an "excellent conference" and "most worthwhile event" the recent **Ashokan Watershed Conference** held in Olivebridge welcomed 92 residents. The stream expert panel answered questions that elicited a lively discussion about watershed issues amongst the audience.

**Contracted with** Woidt Engineering to begin an engineering and planning analysis to reduce flooding, **Flood Hazard Mitigation,** in **Boiceville and West Shokan**. The analysis will be led by the Town of Olive Flood Advisory Committee.

Currently assisting the Town of Shandaken with outreach and public meetings; gathering input from residents as the flood analysis is completed for Phoenicia and Mt. Tremper. Early modeling identified solutions to reduce flood elevations during frequent and large flood events in the hamlets. Costs and benefits of mitigation solutions are being evaluated.


### 4-H Youth Development Program

#### Creating Healthy Places to Live, Work and Play

Winding down a four year commitment, the NAP SACC program (Nutrition and Physical Activity Self-Assessment in Child Care Centers) CHP's partner, Community Heart Health Coalition of the Health Alliance, has achieved impressive goals. The NAP SACC program reached



24 child care centers and trained 335 child care staff members, who effected healthy improvements for over 584 children.

#### Live Well Kingston

Grant News! \$125,000 grant received from the American Planning Association (APA) through its Plan4Health program, to combat two determinants of chronic disease: lack of physical activity and lack of access to nutritious foods. The grant will fund several projects through four Focus Teams.

Travel Well: Focusing on Kingston's sidewalk policy and the Greenline rail trail, with Kingston CS Advisory Council, Bike-Friendly Kingston, and the Kingston Land Trust Rail Trail Committee.

Eat Well: Working on the City of Kingston's implementation of their adopted Eat Well Policy and focusing on increasing physical activity and healthy food in daycare settings. Play Well: Planning a spring event to unite the organizations working on improving parks and play spaces in Kingston. With APA funding, an action plan will be created to implement elements of the Kingston Parks & Rec Master Plan.

Age Well: Conducting a needs assessment to determine barriers that may exist for Senior Citizens in Kingston to lead healthy, active lives. The assessment will include surveys and focus groups to be done in each Kingston Ward.

Sharing unbiased and research based knowledge with residents of Ulster County since 1913, in Agriculture, Environment, Healthy Communities, Horticulture, and 4-H Youth Development.
